MIDLAND

AGRICULTURAL ASSOCIATION.

THE Third Annual Meeting of this Society, was
held in Kain's Inn, Campbell Town, this 6th
January, 1841.

Robert Harrison, J. P., in the Chair.

Resolved—That the existing rules stand as they now are,
with the exception of the following amendment in the
11th, section 3, first four classes, "for the 5 finest woolled
rams," ewes, ram hoggets, or ewe hoggets, as the case
may be, the words, "combining length of staple" be
added.

Resolved—That after this meeting, all new members
shall be nominated by ballot.

Resolved—That the first five and the last seven regula-
tions for the Show stand as they now are, and that the 6th
regulation be amended thus—as far as relates to horses
and cattle to stand as heretofore, but respecting sheep—
"no competitor in future can exhibit more than one lot
in any one class."

Resolved—That the seventh regulation be rescinded,
and the following one substituted, "That an animal,
having gained a class premium, cannot compete again
in any inferior class, nor be awarded a prize in the extra
stock, but may receive a certificate of superiority from
the judges."

Resolved—That should the Secretary for the time be-
ing intend to exhibit stock at any of this Society's
Shows, he shall forward to the Chairman of the Com-
mittee a sealed description of the same, naming the class
or classes in which he intends to exhibit them, at least
fourteen days previous to the Show, which is not to be
opened until the day of Show.

Resolved—That the Committee will nominate on the
Show day two of their members, (not competitors,) to
accompany the judges, so as to prevent interference
during the examination of the stock.

Resolved—That the following gentlemen be nominated
the Committee of Management for 1841:
