AT a meeting lately held, it was considered that
it would be highly beneficial to the greater
part of this colony if a school, in which its youth
should be liberally, economically, and religiously
educated, and fitted either for the university or
other pursuits, could be established at Campbellton,
that place possessing a most healthy atmosphere,
and being so located as to enable parents to send
their children, and to visit them when necessary, at
little or no expense.

The outlines of the plan are as follows:—
the head master is to be a graduate of one of the
universities of the United Kingdom, and, to-
gether with two or three assistants, to be allowed a
good dwelling and a liberal salary.

The board and education is not expected to ex-
ceed £45 per annum, giving an advantage of at
least £20 per annum to the parent of each child,
by comparison with those schools whose distance
would occasion heavy travelling expenses. The
most strict attention to be paid to religious duties.

The committee to consist of equal number of
those of the Scots and English persuasions. But
every rule is to be determined by the majority of
the subscribers votes; each £25 to give a vote,
but smaller sums will be gladly received.
