PATRON AND VISITOR, THE RIGHT WORSHIPFUL THE MAYOR.

CONDUCTED BY MR. HENRY BROWN,

FORMERLY Student at the London University, late Second Master of the Sydney College, some time Assistant at the Normal Institute, and for several years past Teacher of Languages in Sydney; in which latter capacity he has had the honour of directing the studies, not only of many promising youths, but also of Gentlemen, whose names now occupy a highly honourable position in society, and whose literary ardour, admitting of no relaxation, induced them to continue in their manhood those studies with which youth is seldom more than imperfectly conversant.

The subjects for study at this Institution, will be somewhat more extensive than those usually comprised in the general routine of School occupations, as, in addition to a complete Classical and Commercial Course, the reading of the French and Italian Classics will form part of the daily business of the School—an intimate acquaintance with which branches of Education Mr. B. has spared neither time, nor labour, nor expense to acquire; having often observed, with regret, that the Pupil's acquisition of modern languages forms far too unimportant an item in the consideration of the Principals of many Scholastic Establishments; or, that they are only taught by non-resident Masters, and at rare intervals, whilst parents are saddled with the remuneration of those Masters, an expense which they ought not in justice to defray. Mr. B. however would be far from urging the propriety of the younger and less advanced Pupils simultaneously engaging in the study of three or four languages, it being in his opinion desirable that a boy should be able to read and write ONE, with tolerable fluency and accuracy, before encountering the grammatical difficulties of a second.

Mr. B. especially congratulates himself upon the attention he has paid to the critical study of the English Language above all others—as he trusts it will be a sufficient guarantee of his particular regard for that most important part of a British Gentleman's Education, while with respect to the Greek and Roman Classics, he hopes, that after having been engaged in teaching them for nearly thirteen years, (videlicet, eight in England, and nearly five in this country), no parent will for an instant hesitate to believe, that they will occupy a prominent place in his course of instruction. Penmanship, also, with Ancient and Modern History, Geography, Arithmetic, and the Orthography of the different languages the Pupil may be studying, (particularly English Orthography), will be paid minute attention to, and as to the first, which is generally so lamentably neglected in purely Classical Schools, Mr. B. feels assured that, by the system of teaching he intends to pursue, a beautiful hand-writing will infallibly be attained, and in considerably less time than is commonly devoted to its acquisition.

There is only one other point upon which Mr. B. is desirous of touching, and of which, though he feels its extreme delicacy he cannot conscientiously refrain from speaking, viz., the Religious Instruction of his Pupils; with

regard to which, he intends, in compliance with a wish expressed by many parents, to form a Class for the Study of Scripture History and Evidence, on part of every Saturday Morning, for all those whose friends may wish them to belong to it.

In conclusion, Mr. Brown can honestly assure those Parents who shall favour him with the care of their Sons, that neither anxious care nor trouble, either on his part or on that of his Assistants, shall be spared, to forward both their intellectual and moral good; and that, being animated by a real regard for young people, and a fervent attachment to the profession of Education, he will ever find his highest gratification in the happiness and improvement of his Pupils.
