ESTATES OF DECEASED INTESTATES.

It struck us as remarkable, that an account of the names returned by the government, and in the custody of the Registrar of the Supreme Court, should never have been published, for the information of the friends and next of kin to the deceased, who are legally entitled to benefit by their demise, until Mr. M'Pherson assumed the office.

How was it that Mr. J. Edye Manning, during the many years that he and his friend and official coadjutor, who cut his throat, poor man, (we should not have alluded to the sad disaster, only we happen to know that no relative of the deceased unfortunate gentleman is, at present, a resident in the colony) were connected with the handling of this money, amounting to the enormous sum of £3,895 12s. 6d., some of it upwards of ten years due, and detained from the unhappy relatives in England, Ireland, and Scotland, of the deceased parties, without any official publication of the facts being made known.

How many relatives of those unfortunate deceased parties, the majority of whom are mariners, captains, mates, and seamen of ships, might, had they been timely apprised of the premature demise of their relatives in a foreign clime, have availed themselves of the opportunity of escaping misery, claimed their rights, and rescued from the jaws of indelible misery, many that were dear to them.

But why make a mystery of the matter?

Mr. Register Manning, who to have been transported and working (in chains) upon the roads, for the flagrant upon the public and the government, which he, as Registrar, pleaded guilty to—and his dear departed friend, with whom, every one knows his commercial and mercantile transactions were so intimately connected, was proved to be a public defalcator. Hence, it is consistent to opine, that is arguing from rational premises, that as no list of this kind has ever been before published in the *Government Gazette*—over the whole extent of years that Mr. Manning held office, that the items published, amounting to the respectable sum, in these hard times, of £3,895 12s. 6d., which, (by mere chances) is discovered by honest public functionary, to be credited to the office of Registrar, after as many thousands have been misappropriated by his predecessor—Mr. Manning.

But, we do not hesitate to say so—or to defy the Government to persecute us for so saying—for, if we cannot, they (the local government) can prove the delinquencies charged.

All we mean to assert, is this—the plain truth, that Mr. Manning, the associate of the Judges of the land, of the Bishops, (W. G. of Australia.) The man who rivalled in state his betters—rolling with regal dignity to his official duties, to the Supreme Court, daily—was admitted, self-confessed, a *public defaulter*, like his unfortunate (the Sheriff who shot himself)—and we wish to enquire, for the information and satisfaction of the people, how it was, that within the lapse of time included in these intestate lists, Mr. Manning has never thought of preparing a similar one, for the benefit and information of the friends of their distant deceased friends.

That is all—like Paul Pry—we should only like to know?—only it is no business of ours!
