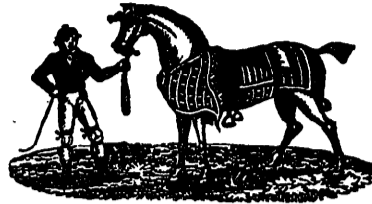

SNOOZER foaled in 1837, got by Muley out of Bequest, by Election.—Muley is the son of Grille, &c. &c.—Bequest bred by Mr. Shad, got by Election, her dam Beninborough, Roxana by Sir Peter, Tulip by Dampier, Eclipse. Rarity by Matchem.

Snoozer stands sixteen hands high, immensely powerful, unexceptionable legs and feet, sound constitution, and fine docile temper; he is a beautiful bay, and black points.
Snoozer ran at the great Liverpool Meeting, July, 1840, for the Croxeth, against Bloomsbury, Lamplighter, St. Andrew, &c, which was one of the severest and best contested races on record, and which was one (a close race) by Bloomsbury. At the same Meeting, Snoozer won against Primus, &c., the Stanley.—(For particulars, see Racing Calendar.)

Snoozer is nearly related to Little Wonder, the winner of the Derby at Epsom; Gibraltar, three and one-half prizes, amongst them the St. Leger; Queen's Plate at Newmarket, one hundred and seventy guineas at Doncaster, Hautboy and five others (all by Muley); of the first races in England. Snoozer's brother to the Magnet, Doubtful Grenada, Gil Blas, Bunturn, &c. &c., &c.
