

**HOUSE BUILDING.**—On Tuesday last William Wilcox summoned John Cochran for the balance due for the building of a house, about five or six miles from Maitland. An agreement was put in, by which it appeared that the house was to be 32 feet in the clear, and 15 feet wide, with a skilling 6 feet 4 inches in the clear, and a verandah in front, the whole length of the house, and 6 feet in width, and that for building this house Wilcox was to receive £16. The house was finished early in February, and the defendant had been living in it ever since. On its being completed he expressed himself satisfied, and promised to pay complainant the whole of the money by the 2nd March last. All the complainant had received from him in money and goods was £4 15s 6d., and there was now £11 4s. 6d. due, which the defendant refused to pay. The defendant attempted to show that the house was not now in a good state of repair; but the bench said the present state of the house had nothing to do with the matter; the defendant had been living in it for three months, and expressed himself satisfied with it when finished; they should therefore order him to pay the amount claimed, with 4s. 6d. costs, within one week, or his goods would be seized and sold.

**BUSHRANGING.**—Bushrangers have again made their appearance in this district. On Tuesday last, between three and four o'clock in the afternoon, two men armed with pistols stopped a man named Timothy Mannix at a place called Deadman's Creek, on the Wollombi road, who was coming with a dray to Maitland, and robbed him of £2 18s. in money, and a part of his rations; they then made off again into the bush. On reaching Maitland the man gave information of the robbery, and the police were immediately despatched in search of the robbers.

**HUNTER RIVER DISTRICT NEWS.**

[FROM OUR CORRESPONDENTS.]

**RAYMOND TERRACE.**  
**IRRAWANG POTTERY.**—We sometime ago noticed an advertisement which appeared in the columns of the Mercury, stating that another home manufacture, and one of a most legitimate character, was about commencing on the Hunter; viz., the pottery at Irrawang, near Raymond Terrace, where it is said the clay is of a very superior description for the purposes of such a manufacture. We understand the works will be carried on to such an extent as to meet the demands of the whole colony for brown and yellow domestic pottery ware, and also for the supply of the neighbouring colonies, by means of the vessels coming to Newcastle for coal. We shall endeavour to visit the works when they are in full operation, and give your readers every information on the subject.

**WINE.**—We would call the attention of your readers, particularly of those who are disposed to encourage our colonial productions, to the fact that really good wine, the produce of the vineyard at Irrawang, may be procured at Raymond Terrace for five shillings per gallon. The wine of this vineyard was considered one of the most superior quality which was exhibited at the late dinner of the Hunter River Society at Maitland.

**DRUNKENNESS.**—On Sunday last some individuals who had been attending divine service at the Catholic place of worship, and who reside across the water, after regaling themselves at the public house, proceeded to their boats in anything but a sober state. Some of these boats had several women and children in them, and it was distressing to behold them at the mercy of men who were intoxicated; it was really wonderful that none of them were capsized. The rev. gentleman who officiated expressed himself much shocked and grieved at the conduct of these men, and we sincerely trust such a disgraceful occurrence will not again take place.

**NEWCASTLE.**  
**STATE OF THE GAOL.**—The following was the state of her Majesty's goal on Wednesday last:—For trial, males 38, females 3; under sentence to hard labour, males 4, females 5; in the cells, males 3, female 1; debtor, female 1; confines, males 11, female 1; waiting for assignment, females 17; total, males 56, females 28. In hospital, males 3, females 5.

**MARKETS.**—There is very little indeed doing at the present time in our market, and trade is so dull that the town appears in a complete state of torpidity. We are in daily expectation of seeing some colonial tweeds from the woolen manufactory at Stockton.

**POLICE OFFICE.**—The business at the police office during the week has been of an extremely uninteresting character: nothing of any consequence has transpired.

**CHARGE OF FELONY.**—The magistrates have dismissed the charge of felony preferred by Mr. Ried against the Messrs. Marshall and their servants, and have expressed their opinion that the evidence brought against Messrs. Marshall does not show that they acted with any fraudulent intention.

**SINGLETON.**  
**THE WEATHER.**—Very little rain has fallen here for some time past. We have had some very severe frosty nights, with cold, raw mornings. The farmers are complaining sadly for the want of rain, as they are anxious to complete their wheat sowing. All the late corn which was not ripe is destroyed by the frosts. We have, however, plenty of grass and water. We had some slight showers of rain, accompanied with stormy winds, yesterday evening.

**THE ROADS.**—Notices are posted calling a public meeting to be held at Mr. Cullen's Inn on the 6th instant, respecting the repair of the road between this town and Leeds, on the Maitland road; but it is to be feared many persons will not attend, as a similar meeting was called some few days since and no one was present. As it appears, however, that there are some important documents relative to this road to be laid before the meeting on the 6th, it is to be hoped that those persons who are really interested in having this road in a good state of repair will attend and give the subject their serious consideration.

**MARKETS.**—The price of flour at the mills and stores is as follows:—Fine 10s per 100 lbs., seconds 14s, rations 12s; bran 6s; good wheat is now selling for 4s a bushel, and some of inferior quality for much less. Bread, the 2lb. loaf 4d., which appears to be rather high in proportion to the price of flour. Beef, 3d per lb., mutton, 2d, fresh pork, 6d. Butcher's meat is now very good. Tea, from 1s 8d to 2s 6d per lb.; sugar, from 3d to 6d; soap, 8d; colonial tobacco, from 2s to 2s 6d, negrohead, from 4s to 5s; and other articles at reasonable and fair prices. Potatoes are readily bought from the settlers at 6s per cwt. Every description of garden stuff in season is good, and at fair prices. June 1st, 1843.

**SYDNEY NEWS.**

(FROM OUR CORRESPONDENT.)

Thursday evening.  
A public meeting took place this afternoon in the settler's wing of the George-street market, for the purpose of taking into consideration the unequal mode of assessment adopted by the city council. The chair was taken by Mr. Alderman Allen, by whom, as alderman of the ward (Brisbane), the meeting had been convened; and who proceeded to open the business with the usual exhortation to give the speakers a quiet and patient hearing, an exhortation, by the bye, which met in this instance the fate which usually attends it, viz., total neglect; for in my whole life I never heard a more noisy meeting than the one of which I am now writing. The first resolution (which merely asserted the inequality and injustice of the assessment) was moved by Mr. Wells, the surveyor, who read a massive written speech, which descended largely upon all the modes of assessment, both ancient and modern, that the speaker or writer (whichever you please) had been able to obtain an account of, and concluded by recommending the citizens in the event of their being refused redress by the council to apply to the Governor and request him to take the matter into his own hands.

After this resolution had been seconded by Mr. Iredale, Mr. Councillor Macdermott came forward with a view of vindicating the conduct of the council, and said (as far as I could gather from amidst the Babel like confusion which prevailed) that the council was quite ready and willing to lower the rate of assessment, if the citizens desired it, but that if they did so the burthen would fall solely upon those who lived in the better class of houses, and all who paid rents of lower amount would not only be excluded from bearing a fair share of taxation but be deprived of the rights of citizenship. He further said that although the taxes in the present instance would not amount to more than about five pence in the pound, it was quite impossible that they could delay proceeding with it any longer, inasmuch as there was an insurmountable necessity for obtaining an immediate supply of funds to meet the current expenses of the corporation.

A little recriminating bye play took place between Mr. Macdermott and Mr. Wells, but I omit all this for the sake of brevity. The second resolution was introduced by Mr. Pite, of the firm of Pite and Preston, in a very neat, sensible speech, and consisted of a somewhat lengthy memorial from the citizens of the ward to the City Council, with a request to the alderman of the ward to present and support it. Mr. Iredale seconded the resolution, which was supported by a very laughable but pithy address from Mr. Stubbs, who produced three models of houses differently assessed by the corporation, as proofs of the inequality with which the assessment had been made; the first, a little barber's shop, with only one room, was assessed, he said, at £50 per annum; the second, a small cottage, containing apparently two or three rooms, was assessed at £75; and the third, a large and handsome house, was only assessed at £31.

These resolutions having been unanimously adopted, the chair was taken by Mr. Councillor Egan, and the usual vote of thanks having been given to Mr. Allen, the meeting broke up. There were about five hundred persons present.

We are told that is so hot in New Orleans, that, standing at any corner, you can see whole suits of clothes walking along, the occupants having actually melted away. What a country!

**COMMERCIAL REMARKS.**

**GRAIN, &c.**—The prices of all kinds of grain, flour, and bread remain without any alteration since our last; there is very little of either wheat or maize at present in the market, but the latter has a tendency downwards, if anything.

**BUTCHERS' MEAT.**—On Saturday last a meeting of butchers was held at Cox's Hotel, East Maitland, to consider upon raising the price of meat. The project was opposed by one of the principal butchers in East Maitland, and consequently it was not raised there, whilst in West Maitland it was raised 1d. per lb. On Wednesday one of the East Maitland butchers raised his meat to his West Maitland customers, but lowered it again to 2d. on Thursday morning; the West Maitland butchers still continue the raised price, 3d., though we are not aware that any corresponding rise has taken place in the price of stock. Good sheep were sold in the beginning of the week for 6s. a head.

**DAIRY PRODUCE, &c.**—Butter, eggs, milk, and poultry continue much about the same, with the exception of ducks, which are now selling at from 3s. to 3s. 6d. a couple. The market is greatly overstocked with colonial produce, and the dealers are consequently timid. There has been a large supply of colonial cheese in the town, which is reported equal to any Derby or Gloucester. Very little business, however, has been done in anything.

**VEGETABLES, FUEL, &c.**—There has been no alteration in the price of potatoes, or other vegetables; firewood and coal also remain as before.

We perceive our neighbours, Potts and Co., have received 983 chests of tea, ex the Marianne Watson, from Singapore; and also a shipment of sugar.
