

land, 8,992; in Scotland, 2,311; and in Ireland, 2,989. The gross total tonnage of all the vessels so entered inwards, coastwise, in 1843, at the various ports throughout the United Kingdom amounted to 12,532,307; and the gross total tonnage of all the vessels cleared outwards, coastwise, during the same period, to 12,571,031, exhibiting the very slight difference between the measurement of the inward and outward sailing-vessels, of only 38,724 tons. Respecting the colonial, it appears that the total number of British sailing-vessels which entered inwards for the colonies at various ports of the United Kingdom during the year 1843 (including the repeated voyages) amounted to 6,404, whose tonnage was altogether 1,405,054; and that the total number cleared outwards was 6,264, whose tonnage amounted to 1,427,233. The total number of foreign vessels entered inwards, and cleared outwards, only amounted to 45 and 36, respectively. The total number of steamers entered inwards from our colonies in 1843 was 344; tonnage, 72,477; and the total number cleared outwards for the colonies, 357; tonnage, 80,185. The total number of British sailing-vessels entered inwards from foreign ports at all the ports of the United Kingdom and the Channel islands, (including their repeated voyages) amounted to 11,263, tonnage, 1,737,210; and the total number of British vessels cleared outwards for foreign ports during the same period amounted to 11,228, tonnage, 1,791,755; the total number of foreign vessels simultaneously entered inwards and cleared outwards having been respectively 8,259 and 7,375. The number of British steamers so entered inwards and cleared outwards was respectively 2,439 and 2,314; and the number of foreign steamers respectively, 533 and 548. The number of sailing-vessels built and registered in 1843 in the ports of the United Kingdom amounted to 653, tonnage, 77,034; and the number of steamers, 45, tonnage 83,097. The total number of vessels wrecked, sold, and broken up in the same year, amounted to 778, tonnage 132,732.

**THE EXCHEQUER.**—An account has been published, by order of the House of Commons, of all monies received during the year ended April 5th, 1844, to the account of Her Majesty's Exchequer at the Bank of England and of Ireland; the amount of all Royal orders and Treasury warrants received; and of the credits and transfers made by the Controller-General of the Exchequer, the payments by the Bank of England, and the balance remaining to the account of the Exchequer at each bank on the 5th day of April, 1844 (Good Friday), per act of 4th Wil-

liam IV., cap. 15. It appears, from the paper thus prepared by the clerks of the Exchequer offices, that the total receipts during the past year, 1843, amounted to the sum of 77,024,004*l.*; that there remained a balance of income in the Bank of England on Good Friday last amounting to 1,679,578*l.*, and one in the Bank of Ireland amounting to 633,671*l.*; making altogether a gross sum total amounting to 79,337,254*l.* The balance of credits at the Bank of England on the 5th of April, 1843, amounted to 656,878*l.*, and on the 5th of April, 1844, to 601,264*l.* The total payments made by the Bank of England during the past year amounted altogether to the sum of 73,279,673*l.*

**CUSTOMS' DUTIES.**—An account of the gross and net receipts of the Customs' duties collected at each custom-house of the United Kingdom during the year ending the 5th of January, 1844, as compared with similar receipts during the previous year, has been printed in the shape of a Parliamentary paper. We find that the total amount of the gross receipts collected in the port of London was, in 1843, 11,354,702*l.*, against 11,422,251*l.*, collected in 1842. The total amount of the net receipts of the same port was in 1843, 10,784,959*l.*, and in the preceding year, 10,836,025*l.* No grand total is given of the receipts throughout the kingdom, but only the total amount collected at each port; and hence it would require several long and toilsome additions in order to arrive at a general result. It is known, however, that the gross total receipts arising from our customs' duties amount to between 22,000,000*l.* and 23,000,000*l.* annually, of which London alone contributes a proportion of 50 per cent.

**PROMISSORY NOTES AND BULLION.**—From a return respecting promissory notes and bullion, it appears that the gross total amount of the promissory notes in circulation throughout the United Kingdom was, during the month ending the 6th of January, 1844, altogether 35,774,259*l.*; the bullion in the coffers of the Bank of England being at that period 14,638,000*l.* During the month ending the 3d of February, 1844, the amount of promissory notes in circulation was 39,056,539*l.*, and the amount of bullion in the Bank vaults, 15,480,000*l.* During the month ending the 2d of March, 1844, the promissory notes amounted to 38,612,587*l.*, and the bullion in the Bank to 16,011,000*l.*; and during the month ended the 30th of March last, the total amount of promissory notes in circulation throughout Great Britain and Ireland was 37,935,893*l.*, there remaining at that period 16,322,000*l.* in the form of bullion in the coffers of the Bank of England.
