OBITUARY.

- Boger, Edmund, Esq., Rear-Admiral of the Blue, on 12th December, at Lipson, near Plymouth, aged 69 years.
- Brown, the Hon. Sir James, Knight, Baron of Colstoun, and a Baronet of Scotland and Nova Scotia. His titles, the second of which was enjoyed by his ancient family before 1116, have devolved upon his eldest son, Sir Richard Brown, Esq., an Honorary Secretary to the Committee of the Baronetage for Privileges, and now eighth baronet, on 30th November, at Moffat, Dumfriesshire.
- Cameron, Lieutenant-General Sir John, on 23d November, at Guernsey, aged 71 years. He was appointed Ensign in the 43d foot in April, 1787, and after passing through the regular gradations of Lieutenant, Captain, Major, and Lieutenant-Colonel, and attained the army rank of Colonel, 4th June, 1814; that of Major-General, 12th August, 1819; and that of Lieutenant-General, 10th January, 1837. On the extension of the order of the Bath, in January, 1843, this officer having received the appropriate honorary distinctions for eight general actions, viz., a cross and two clasps, was appointed a Knight Commander of that Order, and immediately after he received the Order of the Tower and Sword of Portugal. Some years after the termination of the late war, and he had attained the rank of Major-General, he was appointed Lieutenant-Governor of Plymouth; the duties of which situation, and those of the command of the Western District, he continued to discharge for a period of fourteen years.
- Cave, the Hon. Robert Otway, M.P., of Stanford Hall, Leicestershire, and of Castle Otway, in the county of Tipperary, Ireland, on 29th November, at Bath. The deceased was the only son of the late Mr. H. Otway, brother of Admiral Sir Robert Otway, Bart., K.C.B., and Sarah, (now Baroness Braye), only daughter of Sir Thomas Cave, Bart., whose grandmother was heiress of the first Lord Braye. He was married in 1833 to Miss Sophia Burdett, eldest daughter of the late Sir Francis Burdett, Bart., by whom, however, he does not leave any issue. The deceased gentleman was heir-apparent to the Barony of Braye, a title which had been in abeyance since 1557 until 1839, when the barony was called out in favour of the present Baroness Braye, mother of the deceased.
- Denys, Lieutenant Francis Henry, of the 1st light cavalry, (lancers) son of Sir William Denys, Bart., of London, on 10th October, at Balicherries, near Petscuar, Bombay.
- Durant, George, Esq., of Tong Castle, in the county of Salop, on 29th November.
- Gilbert, Captain Thomas, Royal Marines, H.P., father of the present Bishop of Chichester, on 14th December, at Reading, in the 86th year of his age.
- Grote, Major William Henry, late of the 33d regiment, on 9th December, at Clapham New Park, in the 49th year of his age.
- Her Royal Highness the Princess Sophia Matilda, only daughter of Prince William Henry, Duke of Gloucester, (brother to George III.,) and sister to the late Duke of Gloucester, who died in 1834, departed this life on Friday, November 29th, in the 72d year of her age, having been born on the 23d of May, 1773. Her Royal Highness had resided many years in the parish of Greenwich, and was the Ranger of Greenwich Park. The poor and afflicted have lost a sincere friend and benefactor. Her Royal Highness expended a large portion of her income in works of charity, and was first in patronising subscriptions for the benefit of all deserving objects, not only in her own immediate locality, but elsewhere. As Ranger of the Park, she was always solicitous to afford accommodation to the residents of the neighbourhood and the public. The funeral of Her Royal Highness took place on Tuesday, the 10th of December, in the royal vaults, in St. George's Chapel, Windsor, with as much privacy as was consistent with her exalted rank and station.
- Irving, Lieutenant Edward Maxwell, of the Madras Artillery, son of William Irving, Esq., of Westminster. He fell in action, in his 21st year, before the Fort of Samanghur, in India, on the 1st of October.
- James, Captain Charles William, of Her Majesty's 50th regiment of Foot, on 17th Oct., at Cawnpore, East Indies, aged 37.
- Jamison, Sir John, Knt., on 29th June, at his villa, near Sydney, South Wales. The deceased venerable knight was well known some years back as an eminent physician in the navy, and one of the inspectors of hospitals and fleets. He was knighted in the year 1813, and was of the order of Vasa. He had long retired from the active duties of his profession, the date of his seniority in the navy-list being so far back as the 3d of September, 1807.
- Limerick, the Right Hon. the Earl of, on 7th December, at Southhill Park, Berkshire. The deceased nobleman, Edmund Henry Pery, Earl and Viscount Limerick, and Baron Glentworth, in the peerage of Ireland, Baron Foxford, of Stackpole Court, in the county Clare, in the peerage of the United Kingdom, was born on the 8th of January, 1758, consequently had nearly completed his 87th year.
- Man, Major John, son of the late General Gotter Man, Inspector-General of Fortifications, on 12th December, at Woolwich, aged 64 years.
- Mellish, Captain D., of the 10th Bengal Cavalry, on 14th October, at Meerut, East Indies.
- Muter, Peter, Esq., many years an inhabitant of the island of St. Lucia, in the West Indies, on 10th December, at London, aged 61.
- Nash, the Rev. John, B.A., of Corpus Christi College, Cambridge, son the Rev. Okey Nash, of Peckham, Surrey, on 29th Oct., at Lower Clarendon, Jamaica.
- Place, Lionel, Esq., late Captain in Her Majesty's 4th Dragoon Guards, on 13th December, at Albury, near Guildford, Surrey, aged 35 years.
- Shakespeare, Lieut. William Paulett, of the 2d European Infantry, on 28th Sept., before the Fort of Samanghur, East Indies.
- Sir George Farrant, on 15th Dec., at London, in the 76th year of his age.
