The objects of this Society are to protect the interests of South Australia, but more
especially to guard against any encroachment on the two leading principles con-
tained in the Act under which the Province was founded.

These principles are:—

1st. That no land in the said Province shall be disposed of unless at a uniform
price of not less than twelve shillings per acre.

2d. That the whole proceeds of such land shall, without any deduction what-
soever, be employed in conveying poor Emigrants from Great Britain
or Ireland to the said Province.

Such an Institution is especially requisite at the present time, when the admini-
stration of the South Australian Act, as respects Colonization, has been removed
from the hands to which it has hitherto been confided, and combined with the colo-
nization of other Settlements.

The Society does not entertain any purpose or feeling adverse to the new Com-
missioners under the South Australian Act; but is desirous, on the contrary, to
afford them every co-operation in the arduous task which has devolved upon them;
nor does the Society fear that South Australia will suffer from the recent change in
the administration of its affairs, provided that those who have a direct interest in
the Colony through kindred, or the investment of capital there, as well as those who,
on general grounds, are friendly to the principles of South Australian Colonization,
will exert themselves, when necessary, both in defending those principles and in
promoting the most efficient application of them. These duties will more especially
belong to the Committee as the organ of the Society.

The Committee will maintain a regular Correspondence with the Colony, in
order to possess at all times the fullest and most accurate information on matters of
importance.

Besides communicating with the Colony, the Committee will endeavour to estab-
lish Auxiliary Societies in those parts of the Country at home where the subject of
South Australian Emigration has excited or may excite particular interest.

The Committee will, if at any time it should appear expedient, communicate
either with the Colonial Office or the Colonization Commission, on subjects which
shall seem to require the intervention of the South Australian public.

A General Meeting of the Society will be held once in every year, and the
Committee is authorized to call Special General Meetings at its discretion, for the
purpose of reporting progress and ascertaining the views of the Members
of the Society.

Each Annual General Meeting shall elect the Members of the Committee
for the ensuing year; Members who have served before being re-eligible.

The above-named Gentlemen shall be the Members of the First Committee,
with power to add to their number.

The Qualification of a Member of the Society shall be an Annual Subscription
of Twenty Shillings.
