This month the Friends of the National Library, in conjunction with the Australian Garden History Society, presents the lecture 'Cultural Landscapes of Asia: Hidden Gems'.

Taking iconographic examples such as Angkor Wat (Kampuchea), Borobudur (Indonesia) and Bagan (Myanmar), as well as examples of ordinary everyday places, this illustrated lecture looks at the concept of enduring heritage significance and considers these places, in wider terms, as cultural landscapes. Why are such places outstanding examples of a continuous living or nourishing tradition and history? The lecture considers how celebrated architectural monuments are a component of the wider cultural landscape pattern to which they are inextricably tied—the intriguing histories of their settings, and the day-to-day lives of ordinary people shaping that landscape. It argues that seeing the monuments without seeing this wider setting is akin to seeing the leaves but not the tree. Similarly, in considering more ordinary, everyday places, we need to understand the link between people, setting and sense of place.

This lecture will be given by Emeritus Professor Ken Taylor, Adjunct Professor in the Research School of Humanities at the

Australian National University, and Visiting Professor at Silpakorn University, Bangkok. Professor Taylor is a former Director of the Cultural Heritage Research Centre, University of Canberra. He has published nationally and internationally on cultural sites, their meanings and values and on landscape conservation. He is a member of the International Council on Monuments and Sites Scientific Committee, and has acted as a consultant to UNESCO, including presenting a paper at the 2003 UNESCO Fourth International Experts' Meeting in Borobudur, Indonesia, on Historical Landscape Planning. He is currently co-writing a book on cultural mapping for ASEAN countries.

To hear more about cultural landscapes in Asia, don't miss this fascinating lecture. The event will be held at 6 pm on Wednesday 11 June in the Library's Conference Room. The entry fee is \$10 for Friends and Australian Garden History Society members, and \$15 for non-members, which includes drinks after the lecture. 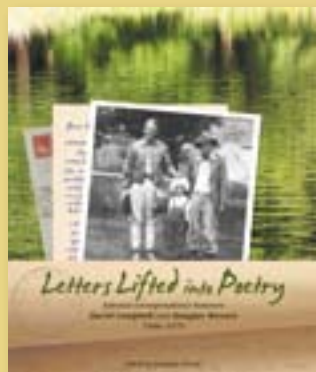

Treasure of the Month

This kookaburra portrait comes from the Library's Ducie Collection, containing 56 watercolours by George Raper, an 18-year-old midshipman on the flag ship *Sirius*. One of the most talented of the First Fleet artists, his works depict the birds and flowers of the Port Jackson area (Sydney), as seen between 1788 and 1790, reflecting the awe and wonder of this first encounter.

The Raper paintings were purchased from the Ducie/Moreton family, in England, in October 2005, having been discovered in an outbuilding of an English manor in 2004. Because the folio had been closed away from light and left undisturbed for more than 200 years, the paint seems as fresh and brilliant as when first applied.

This work and other Raper paintings were copied by his superior officer, Captain John Hunter, for his 'Birds & Flowers of New South Wales, Drawn on the Spot in 1788, '89 and '90', held in the Library's Rex Nan Kivell Collection. Raper's kookaburra toured Australia as part of the Library's *National Treasures* exhibition, 2005–2007.
