The Wangal people were among the first Aboriginals to meet the First Fleet settlers in 1788.

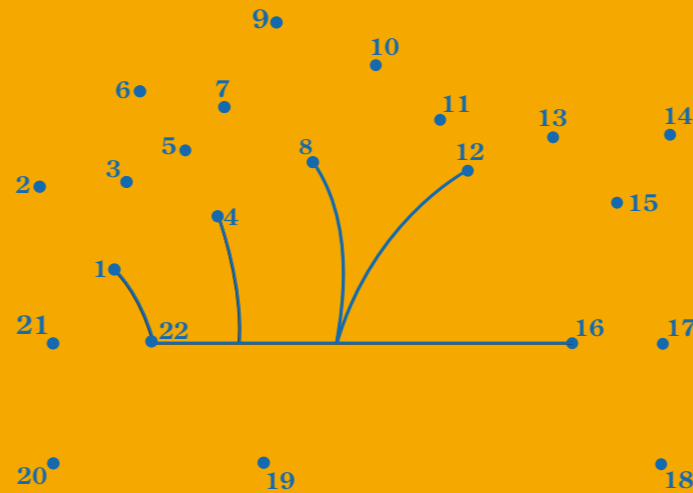


Hello, my name is Bennelong. I was one of the first Wangal people to learn English.
