COLLECTING FOCUS

- Over the last 40 years the Library has steadily reduced its Overseas collecting.
- The 2020 revision of the Collection Development Policy saw a reduction/cessation of collecting in some countries.
- Refocused collecting on core priorities, with a spotlight on Asia-Pacific Region.
- Overseas resources are selectively collected to inform and enhance Australian's understanding or their region and their place in the world.
- Collecting will be increasingly digital, where possible, to enable effective, efficient and sustainable collection building, storage and accessibility.

WHAT WE COLLECT



Australiana - Material by Australians and about Australia published overseas.



Asia-Pacific Region: Indonesia, China, Timor-Leste and the Pacific (including Papua New Guinea, Solomon Islands, Vanuatu, Fiji, and New Caledonia).



Overseas resources are selectively collected to inform and enhance **Australians'** understanding of their region and their place in the world:

- Publications that offer an understanding of global issues, current events and topics affecting Australia.
- Publications that contextualise Australia's history, society, arts and culture, politics and the economy, from exploration and discovery to the present day.
- Reference Works Standard reference works and bibliographic resources.

HOW WE COLLECT

Overseas material is often acquired through:

- Contractual arrangements, such as Blanket Orders or Approval Plans, where Library suppliers are requested to supply all relevant materials based on key principles outlined in the Collection Development Policy.
- Firm Orders, material purchased by the library for the collection.
- Subscriptions to online resources such as databases and oneoff purchases of Archives.
- Standing Orders, serials and ongoing publications.
- Unsolicited Donations from the public.



The **Jakarta Office** was established in 1971, recognising the country's regional significance. The team of four actively collects and catalogues Indonesian language publications and undertakes representational activities within Indonesia.
